



In myth & legend, the Raven is a powerful, mysterious figure, often seen as a symbol of intelligence, transformation & prophecy. In Norse mythology, the god Odin is accompanied by two ravens, Hugin (Thought) & Muninn (Memory), who fly across the world to bring him knowledge. Celtic lore often associates the raven with battle & fate, linked to warrior goddesses like the Morrigan. Across cultures, the raven stands as the crossroads between life & death, wisdom & mystery, making it one of the most enduring & complex symbols in folklore.



The Tiger as a spirit animal represents raw power, courage, & deep personal strength. It symbolises confidence without arrogance, knowing when to act boldly & when to move in silence. Guided by instinct & intuition, the Tiger encourages you to trust yourself. When the Tiger appears as a spirit animal, it is often a reminder that you already carry the strength you need to face the challenges ahead.



The Hare appears widely in mythology & folklore as a powerful symbol of fertility, intuition, transformation & the moon. In many European traditions, especially in Celtic mythology, the Hare is linked to the Moon & to the Otherworld. It was considered a magical creature, sometimes believed to be a witch in disguise. In Irish & Scottish folklore, harming a Hare could bring bad luck because it might be a shape-shifter. In Chinese mythology, the Hare is associated with the Moon through the legend of Jade Rabbit, who lives on the Moon with Chang'e, endlessly pounding the elixir of immortality.



The Pegasus in myth: Pegasus is a legendary winged horse from Greek myth, born from the blood of Medusa when she was slain by the hero Perseus. Symbolising inspiration, freedom, & divine power, Pegasus was closely linked to gods, especially Zeus, for whom he carried thunderbolts to Mount Olympus. In many legends, Pegasus also represents poetic inspiration & wisdom, as his hoof was said to strike the ground & create the Spring of Muses. Over time, the image of the Pegasus spread beyond Greece, becoming the lasting symbol of imagination & heroism.
